## Dr. Jennifer L. Stoever, SUNY Binghamton

The Sonic Color Line argues that American ideologies of white supremacy are just as dependent on what we hear—voices, musical taste, volume—as they are on visual markers...Using an innovative multimedia archive spanning 1845 to 1945 and several artistic genres—the slave narrative, opera, the novel, so-called 'dialect stories,' folk and blues, early sound cinema, and radio drama—Stoever explores how black thinkers conceived America's cultural politics of listening. The Sonic Color Line provides a new perspective on key canonical works in African American literary history and radically revises the historiography of sound studies, amplifying Harriet Jacobs, Fredrick Douglass, Elizabeth Taylor Greenfield, Charles Chesnutt, the Fisk Jubilee singers, Ann Petry, W. E. B. Du Bois, and Lena Horne as agents and theorists of sound.
